
Paul Ewing is a Silicon Valley Information Technology & Cyber security expert. With a Bachelor's and Master's degrees from St. Mary's College, Paul was an early Internet pioneer running the systems, networks and datacenters for such Internet companies as eBay, Yahoo and Google during their early years.

Paul has been an amateur radio operator since 1982, and a very serious DXer. Traveling and communicating all over the world and participating in DX-peditions with other ham operators is his passion. Here is an example. Hope your sitting down!

Paul was the leader of the April 2010 YI9PSE DXpedition in Iraq. Paul was the Co-Leader of the STOR DXpedition to the new country of the Republic of South Sudan in July-August 2011. Paul was a member of the 3D2R-Rotuma Island DXpedition in Sept-Oct, 2011. Paul was a member of the ET3AA team from Addis Ababa, Ethiopia in December, 2011. Paul was a member of the **706T** Team from Socotra, Yemen in May 2012. Paul was the Co-Leader of the **3D2C** Conway Reef DX-pedition in September of 2012. Paul was a member of the XZ1J Myanmar DXpedition in November 15-26th, 2013. Paul was the Co-Leader of the March 2015 DXpedition to Eritrea as E30FB.

Paul was the Co-Leader of the January, 2016 DX-peditions VP8STI in South Sandwich and VP8SGI in South Georgia Islands.

Paul has operated from Turkey, Egypt, Serbia, Macedonia, Greece, Albania, Montenegro and the Falkland Islands. Paul enjoyed his visit to Mount Athos and conversation with Monk Apollo in 2012. continued....

Paul Ewing is a Life member of the ARRL and a very experienced Ham Radio operator. Paul supports the NCDXF and INDEXA.

Paul is the founder of the Intrepid-DX Group (www.Intrepid-DX.com), and is a member of the Palo Alto Amateur Radio Association, Northern California DX Club, Utah DX Association, Araucaria DX Group and the World-Wide DX Group. Paul was honored by the Northern California DX Club as their DXer of the Year for 2012, 2016 and 2017.

Paul has travelled extensively throughout the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (North Korea) in 2015 and has provided opinions and commentary to various media organizations.

Paul has been interviewed extensively my media organizations all over the world including the BBC, Voice of America and NPR. Paul is a Volunteer Examiner and a Youth Mentor at the Dorothy Grant Elementary School Club Station-K6DGE. (www.k6dge.com) and is the founder of the Intrepid-DX Group's Annual Youth "Dream Rig" Essay Contest.


Paul's station consists of an Elecraft K3/Flex Radio 6500 and an Elecraft KPA1500 amplifier. He uses a SteppIR DB36 at 75' for 6-80 meters and a GAP Voyager vertical with elevated radials for 160 meters.

One of Paul's proudest accomplishments is having his son Ryan-N6RYN and his daughter Michelle-KJ6DOM enjoy the Amateur Radio hoppy with him.

When Did DXpeditions Become Popular?

Early DX-peditions were simply exploratory and geographical expeditions in the late 1920s and 1930s, in which one or more radio amateurs participated in order to provide long-distance communications. At the same time they communicated with fellow radio amateurs who wanted to contact a new country. Most notable are the Antarctic expeditions of Admiral Byrd. Another example is the voyage of the schooner *Kaimiloa*, which traveled the South Pacific in 1924. While the ship's wealthy owners enjoyed the islands, an amateur radio operator kept contact with, and sent QSL cards to, experimenters in the United States.

The participation of radio amateurs in geographical expeditions was resumed after World War II, e.g. the participation of Bill Snyder, WOLHS, and Bob Leo, W6PBV, in the Gatti-Hallicrafters expedition in Africa of 1948. ^[1] The most unusual expedition to place reliance on amateur radio for communications was that of Kon-Tiki organized by Thor Heyerdahl in 1947 and using call sign LI2B. ^[5]





DX-peditions are planned and organized to help operators who need to contact that area to obtain an amateur radio award. There are several awards sponsored by various organizations based on contacting many different countries. Perhaps the most famous of these is the DX Century Club (DXCC) award sponsored by the ARRL. The base level of this award involves contacting and confirming 100 distinct geographical entities defined by the ARRL – usually politically distinct countries, and sometimes well-separated administrative or geographical regions within them, such as outlying islands.

Other DX-peditions focus on operation from islands with little or no local radio amateur activity, for the Islands on the Air (IOTA) award which is sponsored by the Radio Society of Great Britain. A small number of DX-peditions focus on activating specific, remote Maidenhead locator squares for the benefit of VHF and UHF operators.

So Does This Look Like Fun?

The FARC has done just about everything over the very many years of the organization. We are once again, post Covid, growing, meeting live, and having fun like we did pre Covid. Brat fries, Field Day, Community involvement, even field trips and member parties. We have never experienced a DX-pedition!

We have huge amounts of equipment in our possession. Rigs, power supplies, antennas, even a grille! It sounds exotic to travel to some foreign land, or some deserted island! But as much as I like to travel, there are many places right here in Wisconsin to visit over some nice warm weekend in the summer and set up camp. Washington Island? MEMBER HIGHLIGHT

Meet FARC Member Paul Tyrdy III N9KLK

My interest in Ham radio and shortwave listening dates back the mid to late 1960's. Paul and his friends were also into the CB era with call-sign (KRK7701). It was fun doing QRP DX on 11 meters to see who could the farthest CB stations late at night with 5 watts. We always were talking about Ham radio. One night we all decided that we would get into Ham radio. We all did our reading and Morse Code practice. Using LP records for CW practice that we borrowed from a ham. I could copy code with them and send code with my code oscillator. Paul lived in the Chicago suburbs but when he went to the FCC testing center in Chicago he could never pass the Morse code test for the Novice license. Paul thinks that it was all nerves that he couldn't pass the code test! So for years, I enjoyed helping my ham friends with projects and do some late night DXing in their shacks as well as doing some shortwave listening.



Paul too enjoyed the Heathkit and Knight kit projects of that era. Time went by fast with finishing school, getting a job and getting married as well as having kids. While moving into our new home my parents gave me several boxes that I had packed away years ago. The boxes were filled with old Popular Electronics QST magazines as well as Allied Radio and Lafayette Radio and other electronic company catalogs along with old notes. Looking at those old notes I realized they were my Christmas wish lists.. In the other boxes were some old Heathkit and Hallicrafters tube radios. Wow that was quite a gift! By this time people were asking, what's Paul going do with all this junk. I have to say that looking at the 1960-1970's catalogs and magazines was just awesome!

Well it wasn't long before I had them unpacked, fixed up and running with a simple wire antenna. Do you know how hard it was to find tube testers in that era? The tube testers were in a lot of stores during this period. If you had questions TV and radio repair shops were quite helpful. Paul found out that his doctor was a ham from the ham license plate on his car. He asked him for suggestions on getting my license. He suggested I talk to another ham who was a member of the Libertyville Amateur club. Paul went over this hams house and saw his shack.



By now I was more determined to get my novice ticket with the minimum code needed. It just so happens that the Libertyville Amateur Club was holding a Novice class. After a few months of practice I passed the 5 wpm code test. His callisgn was KB9FRS and he went on to get his Technician license. Paul and his family moved in 1992 to Green Lake due to a job transfer. In the mid 1990's he decided to upgrade to the General license and took the exam at Appleton. He passed the exam and changed his callsign to N9KLK. By this time the 13wpm code requirement for the General license had been discontinued.

Paul and his family moved from Green Lake to Ripon in 2006 after his kids were out of school. Paul in 2021 took and passed the Extra class exam in October. Paul is now an ARRL VE when the Fond du Lac VE's hold amateur radio exams at MPTC.

Paul retired in early 2011 working for what was part of the Bell System, Illinois Bell, Wisconsin Bell, Ameritech SBS Communications and now back to AT&T. He held several different positions with these companies over the years. For the last 19 years, Paul was a Senior Network Engineer in the IT department providing primary LAN/ WAN design support our internal data centers. Just like ham radio, this technology rapidly advanced over the years. Paul retired from AT&T in 2011 and became paid on call certified Firefighter/Chief Safety Officer as well as Fire Inspector for the Ripon Fire Dept. He retired from the Fire Service on 12/31/2020.

Paul is primarily an HF SSB operator and his HF station consists of an Icom IC-781, Heathkit SB-1400, Swan 500C w/external VFO, Kenwood TM-G707 and several other vintage radios. He also has AL-811H amplifier that can be used. He has a roof mounted Cushcraft A3S beam with the 40 meter add-on kit as well as a 40 meter dipole mounted off his tripod. Other antennas Cushcraft ARX-2B and MFJ 1522 for 2meter and 70 cm. Paul has achieved the ARRL DXCC mixed award, Worked All States (WAS) award, Worked All Continents (WAC) award and the ARRL Millennium award.
