

MEET DENNIS PAULIN KB90FM

Master Ham and Amazing Chef!

Meet Dennis Paulin, a great Ham operator, member of the FARC, and official FARC smoker king! As many of you know when working Field Day, our mouths start watering about a week before the event knowing that Dennis will be there with his amazing smoked meat selections!



Dennis Paulin got his start in ham radio when his cousin Chip Tesch W9CET introduced him to HF. Chip gave him a Swan 350 and 40 meter dipole to get started with. He also had a neighbor Chris Theisen N9VIB who encouraged him to get a license along with Chris's dad Chuck Theisen K9IA. Dennis took the Novice exam in the early 1990's at Omro and passed. He started out with the callsign KB9OFM. He later took the General and Advanced exams with Fond du Lac VE group.

One event that really interested Dennis was operating ARRL Field Day at Chuck Theisen's farm on Martin Rd. That location was famous with our club because it was loaded with mosquitoes. The next year the club had ARRL Field Day at the Fond du Lac County Fairgrounds with a strong thunderstorm that almost flooded out our tents. It rained so hard that we had to cover up the generator with a tarp or it would kill the engine.

Dennis said that contesting was something he enjoyed with the hobby. He bought a used Yaesu FT-101E and participated in the ARRL sweepstakes contest with some encouragement from Chuck Theisen K9IA.

Dennis also bought a box of QSL cards since he was getting cards from quite few amateurs once he got into contesting. Dennis told me he remembered one particular ARRL Field Day at the UW campus where Joe Streeter AA9TV got these heavy U.S. Army canvas tents from the National Guard armory in Fond du Lac. He said they were lots of fun to put up and tear down after Field...



....Day was done. He said it took about six to eight hams to put them up and take them down.

Dennis has had lots of HF transceiver over the years. His first modern HF transceiver was a Kenwood TS-520S and then a Icom C-706 MKIIG. The first new HF Transceiver was a Kenwood TS-570S using a Butternut vertical and he also had an inverted L which allowed him to operate 80 meters. He also tried HF mobile with a Yaesu FT -890 in the car. Dennis then bought a Kenwood TS-850AT that he used on contests along with Yaesu FT-900. Then he upgraded to the Kenwood TS-870S and Yaesu FT-2000. His current HF transceiver is a Kenwood TS-590S.

One area of amateur radio that Dennis enjoys almost as much as contesting is planning and building HF antennas. He likes experi-

QDX QRP DIGITAL TRANSCEIVER REVIEW

Weighing in at 157 g and just a little bigger than a deck of playing cards, the QDX transceiver is the newest offering from QPR Labs (https://www.qrp-labs.com/qdx.html). It's a digital only transceiver that will out put 5 solid watts of power. There are two versions, one that can be built with 9 volts or one for 12 volts input. The company will, for an additional charge, prebuild yours and send it to you. But, the wait time for the build and the shipping from outside the USA can take several months.

I lucked out! I found a ham selling a QDX for the same price as the prebuilt kits from QRP Labs on QRZ.com. I missed out on that sale, but he said that he had several more kits to build and he was willing to wait a week until I had money to purchase it. So, a week and half later, I had a QDX transceiver in my hands. The rig runs a proprietary SDR software that is upgradable. My rig came with version 1_05 installed. Shortly thereafter, QRP Labs released version 1_06. I have not yet upgraded the firmware yet, but I will do so before I next activate a POTA site.

It was one of the last mild weekends in December, when I packed up my gear and drove over to Eldorado Wildlife Area, K-4284, and tested my newest acquisition. I set up my Raspberry Pi4 (itself is about the size of the QDX) and connected that to the QDX. Both the Pi4 and the QDX had separate power sources, in this case the 6 amp 12v LifePro4 batteries was for the QDX. The 8 amp 12 v was for the Pi4 as it needs a full 5 amps to run properly. (I use a buck converter between the battery and the Pi4). I used a Wolf River Coil mini mounted onto the back of my SUV with several ground radials attached to the mount. This all connected nicely, using an old Amazon fire tablet as the head for the Pi4, I received 30 to 40 decodes on 20m FT8. I started my activation, spotted myself on the POTA spotting page, and saw that the Reverse Beacon Network was hearing me. The RBN will spot your

activation on the POTA spotting page. But, then nothing for 3-4 minutes, not even from the RBN. The rig was sending, but nobody seemed to hear me. I then noticed that the power slider on WSJT-X was not up all the way to the top, and therefore was not running at full power. I moved the power slider to the top, and I took one more step. I used an extension rod that Wolf River Coil sells to make their coil a center loaded design and added the rod to the base of the mount and put the coil with the whip antenna at the top. I immediately received multiple hunters. This activation lasted about an hour and I QSO'd 27 hunters.

The next day, I went out in the morning, and I used the same set up on 40 m, FT8. I encountered no problems this time and I received 25 QSO's for my POTA activation, which last about an hour. I do not know if the center rod does anything to improve signal strength or just moving the power slider up to the top in WJST-x is the difference.

There is some discussion on IO Groups (QRP Labs) about this rig giving off magic smoke. It seems to me that a large portion of the problems maybe traced to several issues. First, kit builders soldering is not as good as it should be. They may have caused a short and blown the finals. Lastly, the SWR may be to high. This is why I bought my QDX prebuilt as my soldering skills would look like a dinosaur pooped on it!

Secondly, I used a NanoVNA to check my SWR on my WRC. I was able to bring the SWR nearly to 1:1. I also checked the QDX for heat during the two activations by placing my hand on the rig. I felt only a slight bit of heat. I realize that was not a scientific way of checking the rig, but a few people reported the rig becoming very hot. I thought if the rig was running cool, there would be no problems. So far so good.

I have one main POTA activation rule, don't go out when its below freezing. As the weather is now below freezing, I will have to wait to use equipment and remove the center rod and see if that makes a difference.

USB C to USB B cable to connect the Pi4 and the QDX. It's the same kind I use to connect my FTDX3000 and my PC for digital mode. So I had an extra one.

WRC with a Diamond K400 mount. Also, 8.5 foot whip. I attached some ground radials of different lengths. I feel they aid in the tuning of the WRC.

Amazon Fire tablet. It was refurbished and about \$40. I had to add the VNC viewer to it by side loading it.

ARRL GRANT PROGRAM



It was a long wait, but we did not get the ARRL grant. We sent applications twice for both grant programs but there were just too many applicants. Here is the letter I received from ARRL program director Mike Walters W8ZY

The second round of the Club Grant Program is complete, and the Grant Review Committee has finished their selections. This round produced eighty-five applications for a total of 1.1 million in requests. This far exceeded the available funding and unfortunately many good grant proposals will not be fulfilled. I am sorry to say that your request will not be granted.

Should the Club Grand Program continue into 2023 with additional rounds of applications we invite you to reapply. We hope that this will not deter your club from the excellent work that you continue to do in the ham radio community. Continue to monitor the ARRL website for additional opportunities.

NEW TESTING DATES ANNOUNCED FOR 2023

I have scheduled four exams for 2023 for the following dates February 18, 2023, April 15, 2023, October 21, 2023 and December 9, 2023 in room O-122 at MPTC. Everyone taking amateur exams is required to get a FRN from the FCC website to put on their FCC application as well as provide a photo ID. Cost of the exam is \$15. Preregistering is encouraged, but walk-ins are allowed at the exams. Ham Application Fee (Effective April 19, 2022)

The FCC has announced that effective on April 19, 2022 they will begin assessing the \$35 application fee on new, renewals and vanity callsign applications. Upgrades to amateur licenses will be exempt from the \$35 application fee according to the ARRL-VEC. Administrative updates, such as name changes, mailing or email address changes will be exempt from the fee. VE's and VE teams will not have to collect the \$35 application fees at exam sessions. They will charge the normal \$15 ARRL-VEC exam fee to applicants. The successful applicants will be required to pay the \$35 application fee directly to the FCC by using the CORES FRN registration system. When the FCC receives the examination from the ARRL-VEC, it will email a link with payment instructions to each successful candidate who will have 10 calendar days from the date of the email to pay the application fee. After the fee is paid the examinees will receive a second email from the FCC with a link to their official license. The link will be good for 30 days. Additionally, the FCC stated that applications processed and dismissed will not be entitled to a refund. This includes vanity requests where the applicant does not receive the requested callsign.



GEORGE ULM W9EVT

It is with great sadness we announce the passing of George Ulm W9EVT. George Edward Ulm, of Greengate Farm, passed away peacefully, on December 21 2022. He was surrounded by several members of his family at his passing. He was active on several nets, Ohana, Michigan UP, Teenagers and several others.

The FARC was honored to have him recently as entertainment during one of our meetings.

George Ulm, W9EVT was born in the Free City of Danzig in 1930. In the mid-1930s he moved to Chicago with his family. After W.W.II, he produced some of the first convention exhibits for the Radio Parts Show in the Windy City. His business later expanded to world's fairs and conventions such as the CES in Las Vegas and Chicago. George is a Korean Conflict veteran, taught electronics in the Navy Air Corps, developed and put on air the first two meter amateur repeaters in the Midwest.

George has lived in Mexico, Europe, Africa and Australia with ham calls associated with each part of the world. In the early 1960s he purchased an apple and cherry farm on Washington Island, WI. At retirement he decided to raise antennas on the property instead of fruit. He lives there year round with his wife Susan, and his dog, Bosun (SK).


